



I -- A'MRD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to following named individuals:

rrivate First Class Charles E. Rush, 36714743, Corps of Engineers, Company "A", 328th Engineer Combat Battalion. For heroism in action. On 19 March 1945, near * * *, Germany, Private Rush cleared a large tank trap, located in the Siegfried Defense permitting the tanks following to attack as scheduled. This mission was accomplished in the hours of darkness and while subjected to artillery, mortar and automatic weapon fire from close range. Private Rush's actions in the accomplishment of this hazardous mission reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Crawfords-ville, Indiana.

Staff Sergeant Louis T. Chisti, 33461053, Infentry, Company "B", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 21 March 1945, near ** *, Germany, an enemy counterattack forced Company "B", 409th Infantry to withdraw from previously captured enemy emplacements and trapped five men in one of the pillboxes. Approximately 40 of the enemy stormed the position with small arms and blasted the fortification with bazooka fire. Sergeant Quisti, weapons platoon sergeant, immediately organized a twolve man assault group and led them against the enemy. The hostile force, confused by the surprise attack, withdrew, enabling the trapped men to escape. Sergeant Quisti's outstanding leadership and initiative reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Manticoke, Pennsylvania.

Corporal Maurice P. Jenkins, 16170231, Field Artillery, Battery "A", 362d Field Artillery Battalion. For heroism in action. On 21 March 1945, as the First Battalion, 409th Infantry assaulted fortified positions near * * *, Germany, Corporal Jenkins, disregarding small arms fire and danger of mines, crawled over an exposed field to within 200 yards of an enemy pillbox and set up his radio. Although heavy mortar fire forced the forward observer party to disperse, Corporal Jenkins remained with his radio and transmitted fire directions to our artillery. Under cover of the artillery fire, the battalion

was able to capture five pillboxes and a system of trenches. Corporal Jenkins' actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Champaign, Illinois.

Private Joe V. Jenkins, 34933818, Infantry, Company "L", 409th Infantry Regiment. Por heroism in action. On 23 March 1945, near * * *, Germany, anti-tank fire held up the advance of a task force. Private Jenkins and three riflemen, disregarding heavy small arms fire, moved forward over 75 yards of open terrain to locate the hostile emplacement. Despite the intense fire which wounded his three comradus, Private Jenkins placed effective fire upon the enemy position, forcing the crew to abandon the gun. His actions, which enabled the task force to continue on its mission, reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Anderson, South Carolina.

II -- AMARD, POSTHULOUS, OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded, posthumously, to following named individual:

Private First Class Stanley P. Berdincki, 36199775, Infantry, Company "K", 409th Infantry Regiment. For heroism in action. On 20 March 1945, near * * *, Germany, during an assault by two infantry companies on a fortified hill, one company was pinned down by intense enemy fire, exposing the flank of Company "K". Despite the intense enemy fire, Private Berdinski made his way to the pinned down company, informing the commanding officer of Company "K":s precarious position. The infantrymen quickly redoubled their efforts in a successful seizure of the hill. Private Berdinski was mortally wounded while continuing his mission. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military service. Residence: Muskegon, Michigan. Next of kin: Miss Jessie A. Berdinski, (Sister), 2051 South Hudson Street, Muskegon, Michigan.



I -- A"ARD, FOSTHUKOUS, OF SHAFR STAR. Under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, the Silver Star is awarded, posthumously, to following named individual:

Frivate First Class Francis R. Micholas, 39342017, Infantry, Company "L", 409th Infantry Regiment. For gallantry in action. On 21 Parch 1945, near * * *, France, Frivate Micholas, BAR man, after neutralizing two enemy emplacements moved forward to within 25 yards of a pillbox, and firing his automatic rifle wounded one enemy soldier and captured a machine gunner. He then fired through the door of the pillbox, forcing four more of the enemy to surrender. On 23 March 1945, near * * *, Germany, the point of a task force was halted by a road block covered by two anti-tank guns and small arms fire. Disregarding the enemy fire, Private Micholas crossed 75 yards of open terrain and delivered effective fire into the enemy positions. Although hit by enemy fire, he continued his one can assault until he fell mortally wounded. His actions reflected the highest traditions of the military sarvice. Residence: Springfield, Oregon. Next-of kin: Mr. Ralph F. Nicholas, (Father), Route 2, Springfield, Oregon.
